What ABOUT the Water in Sierra Madre? Chris Cimino Tells All!



On October 24, the SMHPS was pleased to host, up at Lizzie's Trail Inn, the very early (7am!) Rotary Club of Sierra Madre monthly meeting. SMHPS has entered into an informal partnership with Rotary to work together on historical events, and also provide monetary support for our historical Archives at the Library. A large number of Rotarians turned out, as well as some early bird Historical Society folks, and the Rotarians enjoyed the docent tours of both Lizzie's Trail Inn and Richardson House.

This is truly a match made in heaven (historically speaking!), and between the two events we worked together on (Cemetery and Ward's) we raised a total of over \$3,700 for the historical Archives! Stay tuned for more wonderful collaborations between Rotary and SMHPS in the months to come.

appy New Year! I welcome all our new members to the Sierra Madre Historical Preservation Society and our continuing membership with a grateful thank you for all your support! I also want to take this opportunity to thank all the volunteers that have helped us throughout the past year; we could not do all that we do without you! 2023 was a busy year for our little historical society – as you will see in reading the recap of our events. This 2024 year is looking like an even busier one!

We are continuing our collaboration with the Sierra

Madre Rotary on several walking tours to occur this year. The Rotary is working on a wonderful new booklet that will help to show off our little town. It will include a walking tour that SMHPS hopes to bring to life this spring and throughout the year. So, we will keep you posted on when this and other historical tours of our town will occur.

Our Board is working on putting together several speakers during the year on topics such as: our water's history, specific history of our mountain communities, and historic people that have made outstanding contributions along our Foothills. We are always open

for new ideas that you may have or people that you know who would be available to present an evening talk. We are also exploring different times for our presentations.

We are continuing our Teen Docent Program and will be working with students from 7th – 12th grade. We offer them volunteer credit hours. If you know of a student that would be interested, please get in touch with us through our website: smhps.org.

Our work with the city to improve the buildings of our two museums: Lizzie's Trail Inn and the Richardson House is ongoing. We hope to get the roof finally fixed at Lizzie's and have the back room of the Richardson House renovated so that we can re-create a kitchen that would be appropriate to the time that Lizzie and the Ormes were there. This seems to be one of those "lifelong" projects for our historical society and we would like to see this finally completed. Because the city owns our 2 museums, we are dependent upon them to get this work done – and we are hoping that it will be very soon. (I have been working on the renovations at the Richardson House for the past 10 years! – So, it is time!) I am asking for your support in these two projects. I believe that our city manager; Jose Reynoso and our



City Council may benefit from hearing from you. They need to understand that our museums benefit a lot of school children and hundreds of visitors each month. We need to take pride in our museums and fix them so that they will be comparable to other small museums in the San Gabriel Valley; Monrovia, Arcadia, Temple City just to name a few. I look forward to your input and an exciting 2024! See you at our next event.





Members of the Historical Society and other volunteers from town portrayed some of the Sierra Madre pioneers, both from the early days and from more recent times, who helped contribute to what makes our town so special. Visitors heard from early residents such as John Richardson and Nathaniel Carter, to more recent residents such as Mary Tumulty and Jim Heasley, Jr.

Many volunteers worked on this event, including SMHPS members, Rotary Club members as well as their Interact youth group, and other interested volunteers from other businesses and groups in town. We thank them all, as well as everyone who attended the event! We must also do a shout out to the Pioneer Cemetery Association, especially Robert Gjerde, for the pristine condition of the cemetery at this event.

It was a very successful event, with the total proceeds of \$2,240 earmarked for the Archives in the refurbished Library. We hope everyone who attended had a wonderful day learning about our past and our history.


Sierra Madre: What John Muir Saw in 1877

n June 15 of 2023 we were treated to a program from Ed Anderson, President of the Arcadia Historical Society, on naturalist John Muir and photographer Carleton E. Watkins. His presentation explained how Muir came to our valley, and why Carleton was here taking photos.

Mr. Anderson shared with us that these two men were friends, but they could not have been more different from one another. John Muir came to visit friends in Pasadena and explore the San Gabriel Mountains. Carleton Watkins was in the area as the principal photographer for Collis Huntington's Central Pacific Railroad.

We thank Ed Anderson for his talk and for sharing with the Society not only information on John Muir's travels, but many of the wonderful photos of Carleton Watkins.




