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
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Wanted: Passengers for a MT Lowe railway experience

Before there was Disneyland there was Mount Lowe, the mountain marvel resort first created by Thaddeus S.C. Lowe. From 1893 to 1937 millions came from all over the world to visit "Earth's Grandest Mountain Ride" as Lowe called it.

Michael Patris, founder and president of the Mount Lowe Preservation Society will present a slide program about this fabulous attraction high above Altadena and about Thaddeus Lowe who in 1850 attempted to cross the Atlantic Ocean in a balloon, served as Chief Aeronaut for the Union Army during the Civil War and then did so much more after retiring to Southern California in 1888.

Richardson Family Bible donated by Margaret S. Lusinger. Margaret traveled with her family members on a rainy November morning to donate this wonderful artifact. All the Richardson births, deaths, and marriages are carefully recorded in the Bible and have already been made available to interested researchers.

Ken Taylor donated a Pacific Electric Railroad spike from Kersting Court. It is a welcome addition to our collection, rust and all. Ken also gave a 1912 map of the Pacific Electric Railway map and a book by Donald Duke titled Pacific Electric Railway: A Pictorial Album of Electric Railroading. We are delighted to have these artifacts in our collection.

Julie Morez has given the Archives many Sierra Madre postcards. The most recent is a wonderful photographic postcard of the interior of the chapel at Switzer's Camp. Reactivation of the Oral History Project A Progress Report

In 1988 Jayne Kistner organized an oral history project sponsored by the Sierra Madre Library. Between the years 1989 and 1994, 110 interviews were conducted by various volunteers. Eighty five Sierra Madreans were interviewed in this process. The aim at that time was to transcribe the interviews and publish them in book form. Sixty three of these interviews were eventually transcribed. Only one was published in book form. The project waned after 1994. Following the death of Jayne Kistner in 1997, no further work was done.

At a Board meeting of the Historical Society on 15 August, 2002, interest was expressed in re-activating the project. Paul Neiby volunteered to put the existing collection in order and to prepare us to conduct a new series of interviews.

On September, 2002, personnel from the Oral History Department at Cal State Fullerton conducted an oral history workshop in Sierra Madre which eight people attended. In October, Paul Neiby attended a workshop in San Diego sponsored by the National Oral History Association.

Also, in September, the library purchased a tape-reading dictaphone. In early October we began to sort through the 240 existing tapes. Each tape was checked for quality, rewound and properly labeled. We also constructed a database to track the collection. This process was completed a few days before Christmas. We now have a full and properly labelled archive of original tapes.

In the week of January 12, we will begin work on replicating 20 tapes which have no working duplicates. Then, with a full archive of working duplicates, we will begin to transcribe the 47 interviews that remain unfinished. We estimate the cost of transcription at \$6,000. We also need to collect release forms, 45 of which were never signed.

Purchase of new recording equipment:

We have made a thorough search of recording devices. We need a portable machine, of high quality and one fairly easy to use. The choice is between a cassette recorder and a digital recording device. The library technology grant has allocated \$1,000 for this purpose. We hope to make the choice and complete the purchase in January, 2003. Then we will gear up and begin a new series of interviews.
