
ON ROUTE 66 WITH JIM CONKLD



During the month of October the Library display case will feature photographs and ephemera from Sierra Madre Pioneer Days of the past. On Saturday October 2, hike into history to Strain's Camp with San Gabriel mountain historian John Robinson. A pancake breakfast will precede the hike at the covered picnic area near the Mount Wilson Observatory. Telescopes will be open for touring.

Saturday October 9th at Ward's Ranch from 12 to 4 pm celebrate Pioneer Families with old fashioned activities – pioneer dress-up, butter making, clothes washing, apple bobbing, 3-legged races, wheelbarrow races, a watermelon seed spitting contest, and much more. That evening at Ward's sample some of the best local chili recipes at the Chamber of Commerce Chili Cookoff from 4 to 6 pm. Join Sierra Madre's Treasures (old timers) in Memorial Park under the pergola for some story swapping from 10 am to 2 pm.

On Sunday October 10th, join us for more fun at Ward's Ranch from 10 am to 4 pm as crafters will show their wares and antique engines will be on display.
