Local historian Laron "Terry" Terrell will be the special speaker for the Historical Preservation Society's Annual Meeting on January 16. Terry's talk is titled "Trails, Tall Tales and Timber: The Story of the Mountains Once Called Sierra Madre."

The story starts in 1841 with the arrival of trapper/trader Benjamin Davis Wilson to Mexico's California. The saga deals with the more or less true tales of his exploits, adventures, ranchos and family stories. Wilson's workers widened an old Indian trail in 1864 to retrieve timber from the mountain top. This trail to Wilson's Peak would become the crack in the wall of the wilderness for the settlers in the Indiana Community and other towns in the area. The gold rushes, the disasters, the speakeasy, the Revenuers, the horse thieves and cattle rustlers are all part of the story of the mountains. Local history is filled with the shenanigans of the characters that inhabited the mountains and the legends left behind in their dust. Please join us for a wonderful evening of historical anecdotes and slides presented by Mr. Terrell. There is no charge for the evening's program and complimentary refreshments will be served.

Thanks to the hospitality of Dr. Paul and Louise Neiby, the Historical Society's Book Committee recently had a productive luncheon meeting in the Ramada room of the Neiby's home. The room boasts a massive fireplace built by Gutzon Borglum, Mt. Rushmore sculptor and former Sierra Madre resident. We had as our guest Michele Zack, the author of our forthcoming book. There was much discussion about subject matter, layout and design and use of images in the book. A curriculum for area schools is in the works with help from some local teachers. Michele has completed drafts of four chapters of the proposed eight chapter book. She expects to be finished writing in June or July, 2007.

Jeff Lapides has been chosen to be our book designer. Jeff was the designer on the last two books written by John W. Robinson, Sierra Madre's Old Mount Wilson Trail and Gateways. With more than half of the money raised and completion of the book draft expected this summer, the committee is pleased with our progress, but we realize we still have more work ahead. Help is still needed with research and finding photographs and images to illustrate the manuscript.

More funds are still needed as publishing costs continue to rise. The Sierra Madre Historical Archives is actively collecting materials, especially photographs, from the 1950s to the present. These historical items are greatly needed to complete our local history information. While at a glance more recent materials may not appear to have historical value, it is imperative that we collect materials from the last half century so that we

may tell the Sierra Madre story more fully and accurately.

We hope to find materials documenting a variety of Sierra Madre events over the years (Rose Float construction, 4th of July Parade, Easter Egg Hunt, Art Fair, Mt. Wilson Trail Race, Huck Finn Fishing Derby, Aqua Fair at the canyon pool, etc.). Images of the effects of the Sierra Madre earthquake (June 28, 1991) are also wanted for the collection. Every day Sierra Madre photos from 1950 to the present are also welcome. We are interested in the image of the kids washing the car in the driveway and of them climbing the citrus trees in your back yard.

When you clean out your garage, attic, or closets, and find Sierra Madre stuff, think of the Archives before you toss. Shopping a little out of Down Town

Don't forget gift shopping at the Society's museum in Lizzie's Trail Inn. Available items include most of John Robinson's books including his Mount Wilson Trail book, the reproduction of the 1906 Dictionary of Sierra Madre, a perfect hostess gift at \$5, historical note cards and postcards, walking tour maps, reproductions of the Bird's Eye View of Sierra Madre ready for framing in black and white and a beautiful colorized version. **The museum is open from 10 am to noon on Saturdays** and is located at the corner of Mira Monte and Mt. Wilson Trail. After the first of the year construction on the reservoirs behind Lizzie's will begin. Plans are to fence around the Richardson's House and Lizzie's during construction, but in such a way that access to Lizzie's Museum on Saturday will still be possible.
